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THE LEAGUE CUP.

Wolves had three compari tively easy draws in the League Cup this season.

On Sept. 4th they played a 2nd round tie against Fourth Division Southend United at Molineux, Southend won the hearts of the Wolves fans with a fighting, spirited performance. Admittedly Wolves played extremely badly but they did not penetrate Sounthends defence until the 89th minute when John Farrington hit a good shot from the edge of the box. Southend's players wept with disappointment but the whole ground applauded Southend off the pitch at the end with the North Bank chanting "Southend, Southend" for fully two minutes.

In the 3rd round Wolves were fortunate in having a home draw with Second Division leaders Millwall. Wolves turned on a sparkling performance, Dougan scored with a spectacular diving header almost straight from kick-off and that remained the score until half-time.

Millwall equalized ten minutes after the re-start but Wolves replied immediately when Munro scored after Bailey's long throw was backheaded across the goal. Kenning scored Wolves third from the spot after Parkin, who was surely man of the match, was up-ended in the area. Two fine goals (a header and a shot) from Farrington finished the goal spree giving Wolves a 5-1 win.

Blackpool was the next trip for Wolves and their supporters in the 4th round. Blackpool, rated by many the best side in division two, started confidently but Wolves should have been leading at half-time when Dougan and Wignall should have scored. The teams however, went off level 0-0 at the interval.

Suddick scored Blackpool's first from a well taken corner. Wagstaffe replied for Wolves with a swerving left foot shot but joy was short lived when Marsden "cashed in" on Williams mistake to put Blackpool into the draw for the 5th round and Wolves out for another year.

Well there is always the F.A. Cup!

Wolves started brightly, trying to restore some confidence after their thrashing the week before. It was Coventry though who went close first. Hunt netted but was off-side, also hit the post and had a volley go close. A header from Hateley was well saved by Boswell to relieve pressure. Play swung from end to end and at half-time an interesting match was developing.

Wolves forward line lacked bite and Leicester realizing this, were content to sit back and play on Wolves poor finishing. Their lead could easily have been increased in the second half but for equally bad finishing.

These goals gave Wolves another two points from a splendid performance. Dougan was outstanding in attack well backed up by Knowles and Wagstaffe.
